You gave Paul a smile to match his patriotism!

erving in the military was a family

tradition and something he had

looked forward to his entire life.

His father had served in the Marine

Corps and his grandfather had served

as a mine tech in World War II. The

patriotism ran deep.

When Paul got out of the Navy he was broken.

Paul didn't have a typical education. Just like his father, he attended Harlingen Marine Military Academy. After graduation he promptly enlisted in the U.S. Navy.

During his years of service Paul saw things many of us can't imagine. He served overseas in Libya in a war zone and carried the pain with him even years after his service ended.

After being honorably discharged from the military in 2012, Paul went through a rough time. "The transition is not always easy, so after a while we have to learn to adapt. I think for me, I fell into a state of depression," he said. He struggled with post traumatic stress disorder and didn't know how to handle it. He didn't know how to ask for help. "I drank a lot and smoked marijuana," he recalled. "I struggled with addiction."

The struggle led to a deterioration of Paul's teeth. "With how I was feeling in my life, I struggled to maintain my physical health," he explained. "As my mental health went, so did my physical. I stopped taking care of myself and my teeth. It's a common thing among veterans. When you have PTSD and a mental crisis, you just feel like nothing matters anymore."

Paul is young and healthy. But his poor diet, among other factors, contributed to decay in his teeth that caused significant pain and staining. He was ashamed and did his best to not smile or develop deeper relationships with others.

Eventually, Paul found Camp V, a local nonprofit organization focused on helping veterans re-enter civilian life, as well as to assist them with local resources. At Camp V, Paul found purpose and a new start. (Continued on next page)

As a disabled veteran with limited income, Paul continued to struggle with his teeth, and the pain got worse. He felt like it was hopeless. Last winter Paul went through desperate measures to get relief from the pain, and would put his face into the snow.

Because of you, Paul is no longer suffering from the pain.

Paul was a patient in one of Bethesda's "free" dental clinics last month. Although Bethesda has never been a free clinic, the free dental days are funded through generous donors and volunteers, and spearheaded by

The recipients of the clinic's efforts come from local rehabilitation programs. September was dedicated to helping veterans from Camp V.

After spending just a few hours in the dental chair with Dr. Nichols, Paul's smile was completely transformed.

"I see the light at the end of the tunnel," Paul said, after his procedure. "I have been through the darkest days of my life, but now I have hope from places like Bethesda and Camp V."

Paul volunteers full-time at Camp V and attends Tyler Junior College in hopes of becoming an addiction counselor.

"I now realize that it can be the littlest things, but everything that we do from day to day matters," Paul said.

Paul says his new smile is "life-changing."

Thanks to your generous gifts and the amazing dental volunteers who assisted with his project, Paul is living pain-free and has a fresh start.

Paul says the best thing about his new smile is that it will make his mom happy to see him smiling in this year's Christmas card.

"A smile helps everything," he said. "This will help me continue to establish relationships with other people and with other veterans."

Camp V was just one of many nonprofits who have been helped this year through the free dental clinics. Other groups include Highway 80 Rescue Mission, SonShine Lighthouse, Calvary Commission and New Creation Foundation.

Spotlight: Callynth Finney

You never know when you might run into someone who has been impacted by Bethesda Clinic.



As a mom of three very busy children - ages 15, 12 and 2.5 (yes, I know!) - I can be found all over Tyler. My iphone calendar is filled with PTA meetings, baseball and football games, practices, trips to the dog groomer, and the list quite literally never ends.

The doing of "all the things" does have it's perks when I randomly mention I work at Bethesda Clinic and see someone's face light up. Right away, they story...and I love to listen.

This past spring we were excited to get our family portrait taken by the very talented and well-known Callynth Finney of Callynth Photography. I felt in awe when I walked into her large studio. Beautiful, gallerystyle canvases wrapped with faces of children, brides and families welcomed us into our session. lot of missionaries with YWAM but had no idea this successful photographer, with a beautiful studio in downtown Tyler, had been a Bethesda patient.

"I became a patient at Bethesda right when it opened and I remained a patient until 2019," she told us. "My husband and I were both patients there while we were full-time missionaries. At one time our income was \$900 a month for both of us. We really didn't have anything."

While Callynth and her husband were dedicating their lives to help others, Bethesda was there to help them make a difference.

"We were able to continue our volunteer work without having to worry about that piece of our life," Callynth

said, recalling the importance of a place like Bethesda. "If the car broke down, we just didn't have a car for a while. There were a lot of things we didn't have the money for, but our health was one area that we really did not have to stress about because we knew that we could go to Bethesda."

It dawned on me, again, how much Bethesda is a vital part of our community.

I was so happy to hear that we had helped her when she needed it most. Now, as a successful photographer, she doesn't need to be a patient at the clinic and is able to pass along her spot to someone else.

When you give to Bethesda, you just never know the impact of your gift. Who knew you might be

At the beginning of the session, like a normal conversation, I mentioned I worked at Bethesda Health Clinic. I knew Callynth had taken Dr. English's family photos before, but I was surprised to hear she had actually been a patient as well.


