

the jewel price story

In a life that spanned 93 years, Jewel Caldwell Price devoted herself to her church, community, civic service, and quiet, generous giving. Hers was not a big name. Yet, in every way that truly mattered, Jewel Price lived a big life and left a big legacy of love.

In December of 2002, the First Baptist Church of Tyler gave Bethesda Health Clinic its first financial contribution toward establishing healthcare services for the working uninsured of East Texas. Just a few short months later, Jewel Price took an enormous leap of faith and became the first individual to make a donation to Bethesda Health Clinic.

There was no building. There was no staff. There were no programs. There was just the idea that people of faith could work together to provide affordable healthcare for their neighbors. And Jewel Price wanted to be a part of that effort.

From that moment on, for the next six years, Mrs. Price made a monthly contribution to Bethesda. With each check she included a note of encouragement or a Bible verse. "When the clinic was so young and so few knew of what we were doing, those notes were

a great source of encouragement to us," said Dr. John English, Executive Director of Bethesda. "We knew there was someone else in the community joining us and lifting us up in this ministry."

Upon her death in 2008, Jewel Price made another "first gift" to Bethesda. She made the first planned gift to Bethesda Health Clinic in the form of a bequest from her estate. "When Mrs. Price's attorney notified us of this

gift, I was so moved," said Dr. English. "Her ability to focus on the future and the needs of others is an inspiration to me, and I hope to others. She believed in the clinic and its work, and her planned gift says that she believed in our future. It is the ultimate gift, in many, many ways. It is truly a legacy of love to our community."

In recognition of Mrs. Price's generosity, faithfulness and vision for the future, the Board of Directors of Bethesda Health Clinic voted to create **The Jewel Society**. Those who join Mrs.



Price in making planned gifts to Bethesda will be recognized with membership in this honored group of donors who commit themselves and their resources to a vision for the future and a legacy of service to those in need.

"It is fitting that Jewel Price, the example of her "first gifts" and the example of her life of quiet, dedicated service be recognized with this naming," explained Bethesda Director of Development Diane Thomason.

Though she was never one to seek the limelight, Mrs. Price was, as her friend Mary Morris said, "a true jewel, just like her name. When she received praise she always smiled and just said, 'I was on an assignment for our Lord.'"

Jewel Price never ran out of assignments. Her charitable efforts and dedicated service spanned numerous community organizations. Bethesda Health Clinic is grateful that she counted our work as one of her assignments for her Lord, and we are grateful to carry her name and her faithfulness into the future with the creation of **The Jewel Society**.





"He was never sick. Not a day in his life. He had never had an IV before. Never, ever!" says his wife Tamela as she reaches over to touch his arm with tender affection.



"I was having some lower back pain," says the hard-working, physically fit man with the sparkly blue eyes. A painter and carpenter by trade, hard work and sore muscles were a daily regimen for Chris Childers. "I didn't think anything about it," he says, until he had other symptoms that were harder to ignore. So Tamela carried him to the emergency room, both assuming that he might be experiencing kidney stones.

For her, the experience was surreal. A heart attack survivor herself, Tamela was used to being the patient. Now, seeing her capable, gentle husband in pain was almost more than she could bear. That...... and the unknown. Peace of mind was threatening to slip away.

Cancer is a scary word, made worse for the Childers because they had no medical insurance to cover what was sure to be a long and expensive process. They were tempted to worry, even panic. Instead, they prayed.

As the doctor listened to their circumstances, he made a suggestion that proved to be a God-send. He explained that Bethesda Health Clinic was

designed for hard-working people with no insurance. "We were just praying;" says Tamela, "then, we were so relieved there was someone out there to help."

Still, like so many patients who have experienced medical problems and a healthcare system that is often difficult to navigate, Chris and Tamela assumed the worst. "We were thinking, 'Oh this will take weeks, even months,'" says Tamela. But just a few days later, they sat down with a patient screener at Bethesda Health Clinic and worked through the paperwork together. "The very next week, he had an appointment," says an amazed Tamela.

The volunteer health professionals at Bethesda walked Chris through the appointments, tests, and lab work that followed. "Everyone at the clinic, I mean from the receptionist to the man who takes the applications, the lab workers, our Patient Advocate, everyone makes you feel like you are very important," says Tamela.

Since one of his kidneys was involved, radiation and chemotherapy were out of the question for Chris. Those would

risk damage to the remaining kidney. Surgery was their only hope. That...and prayer.

Soon, Chris was referred to a surgeon and scheduled for surgery to remove the tumor. The news was good. The doctor was able to remove the entire 5x3 centimeter mass and it was



entirely encased in the affected kidney. Tamela giggles recalling the initial moments in recovery after surgery. "They asked him who the president was," she smiles. "McGruff, the crime fighting dog," he finishes her sentence. She could hear the hospital staff laughing from the waiting room. "That's my husband in there," she thought.

"She was my rock through all of this...that, and prayer," Chris says. "And, I definitely want to give credit to the people at Bethesda," Tamela adds. "They were all so positive, helpful and caring."

The experience has had a lasting effect on Chris. "It opened my eyes to what is really important to me, like my family and prayer," he says, "And, I learned I don't like surgery," he chuckles. Both now smile, with a cancer victory behind them, a bright future before them, and peace of mind beautifully restored!



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
